Chevalier de la Légion d'honneur

The order was created on May 19, 1802 by Napoleon Bonaparte, its purpose being the reward of "eminent merit" in military or civil life in fields such as culture, science, industry, commerce, and art.

Among Japanese recipients of the award are Shirakawa Masaaki (former Governor of the Bank of Japan) and Santo Akiko (a member of the House of Councillors). The order has three ranks: Chevalier (Knight), Officier (Officer), Commandeur (Commander), and two dignities: Grand Officier (Grand Officer) and Grand-Croix (Grand Cross). The Legion d'Honneur is awarded to persons who contribute to the advancement of the Franco-Japanese economic relationship and to cultural exchange between the two countries.
